The Ota International Exchange Center ("Minto Ota") Opened on April 11!

A brand-new activity center for multicultural and international exchange has opened in Ota City: The Ota International Exchange Center ("Minto Ota")! Located near the West Exit of Keikyu Kamata Station, the center is the new home of the Global City Ota Cooperation Association and its Multilingual Consultation Desk, as well as Ota City's Internationalization and Multiculturalism Promotion Division. Minto Ota provides support to help people from all parts of the world live comfortably in Ota City. It also hosts events designed to build mutual cultural understanding.

The nickname "Minto Ota" comes from a wish for "everyone in the world to come together (Japanese: [sekaiju no] minna to [isshoni]) and the letters in "Multicultural and International Network, Together in Ota" in English, a language used around the globe. In this way, Minto Ota incorporates the meaning of creating a "multicultural and international network together in Ota City."

Here are some of Minto Ota's features:

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[Multilingual Consultation Desk]

The desk's staff are here to talk if you experience problems in your daily life. Consultations are provided in English, Chinese, Tagalog, Nepali, Vietnamese and other languages

Consultations in other languages are also available. Please ask for details.



[Information and Exchange Area]

Information about various countries and regions is posted here. There are tables and chairs which provide a comfortable setting for talking with other visitors.



[Meeting Room]

A large meeting room is available for use by international exchange groups and other organizations. It can be divided into three smaller rooms. The room is used for a variety of programs and activities, including Japanese language courses and learning support for foreign children.

About Bicycle Parking and Impoundment

Bicycles provide a handy, environmentally friendly way of getting around. But they also become a social problem if left unattended near train stations, as they obstruct pedestrians and emergency vehicles and make the neighborhood unsightly. Although the problem of bicycle abandonment is improving, there are still bicycles left unattended around stations. Ota City therefore asks for your understanding and cooperation in its effort to create a safe city that is free of abandoned bicycles. In accordance with city ordinance, please do not leave your bicycle in public places (such as roads, parks, railway station plazas, or any other place that is not a designated bicycle parking area). Always park your bicycle in a bicycle parking area, even when only stopping for a short time. Ota City designates certain areas in front of train stations as "no bicycle parking" zones per city ordinance. The city regularly impounds bicycles that are left there. Impounded bicycles are generally held for 30 days. They will be disposed of when this storage period expires.

There are four Impounded Bicycle Storage Centers in Ota City. Their details are provided below. If your bicycle was impounded, bring the necessary items (see below) to the center impounding it during the "return hours" on a "return day."

Impounded Bicycle Storage Centers: General information

Return days: Monday to Sunday (excluding national holidays, substitute national holidays, and December 29 to January 3) Return hours: 11:00 am to 7:00 pm Please bring: (1) Personal identification (e.g., residence card, driver's license, etc.) (2) Bicycle key (3) Impoundment fee (3,000 yen for a bicycle)



An event commemorating Ota City's "sports and health city" declaration The 15th OTA Walking: Walking Along the Tama River



Accepting Students for ManaViva (Japanese Reading and Writing Class)

ManaViva is a classroom program for learning how to read and write Japanese characters necessary for daily life (such as hiragana, katakana, and simple sentences) and for basic studies in Japanese language, arithmetic, and other subjects. Students study what they "want to learn" and "want to know" together with classmates and staff members. It is used by people from various countries, including Japanese. Childcare is available for children between the age of 18 months and the third year of elementary school. (Spaces are limited and will be filled as requests are received.)



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This newsletter is published eight times a year in six languages (simple Japanese, English, Chinese, Nepali, Tagalog, and Vietnamese). It is distributed at Ota City facilities, such as libraries, children's centers, and branch offices, as well as at JR Kamata Station, Omori Station, Keikyu Kamata Station, and other major train stations in the city.
